

What is Graphic Facilitation?

Graphic facilitation is the **art of capturing salient points** from spoken communication and modeling them visually, in real time, on a large scale. This involves a graphic facilitator capturing key points, **making connections**, **and creating models** that reflect the essence of group discussion. In most cases, the

graphic facilitator works on a whiteboard at the front of a room, alongside the presenter or panel.

Graphic facilitation can be used to support virtually any kind of meeting or collaborative session in which group discussion plays an important part. Graphic facilitation enhances the overall impact of



a meeting or conference via **dynamic and engaging visual representation** of what is presented and discussed. By creating a visual storyline and a set of iconic reminders of what is most important, graphic facilitation **allows the audience to understand visually and remember more clearly** the key elements of the meeting or conference.

Who are the Facilitators?
